Fish Facts 2018



Below are the results from fishery surveys conducted during the summer of 2018. Lakes are mainly surveyed using two types of equipment – gill nets or downhaul trap nets. The size of fish caught in downhaul trap nets is recorded by total length, while the size of fish captured in gill nets is reported by weight. Population status information is included, where available.
